

**preparation:** Buy some bottles of wine, different fruit juices or different and interesting flavoured waters. This is dependent on the group you have, and if any may have issues with alcohol.

action: Sample different sorts of drinks

**comment**: I hope you enjoyed your drinks this evening. It's amazing to taste different sorts of wine/juice/water with their different flavours and aromas.

We thought last week about Jesus as the Bread of Life. Coming to earth as God/Man, we also thought about how he meets us in the ordinariness of life and can sustain us. What we didn't think about was why he did it in the first place. To explain in just a few short paragraphs the reason he came is very difficult, but here goes.

There is a lot of good in our world, but it doesn't take long to see that there is also a lot of bad. It's pretty broken in many places. The truth is we all have that broken strain within us, its a bit like faulty genes that *we* activate. This is not the way the world was created to be, we broke it and continue to break it. Not just through the big things like wars and murder, but our own anger, lies, unwillingness to forgive and broken relationships.

Question: If this world is 'broken' do you think it can be fixed?

Christians believe Jesus came to fix it, fix our brokenness. Why? Because it's blocking *our* relationship with him. Cutting ourselves off from the source of all life we are left facing the only alternative – death. But he wants to make us whole, to share in the joy of knowing him, have a purpose and enjoy eternity after we die.

It's no surprise that this is where his life and death enters the story. Jesus lived a life to show us how to live and died to give us the opportunity to live that same life. He took all our wrong and dealt with it in his death and resurrection. He rose again (Christians believe that means he came back from death three days later with a brand new body and as a new and different form of life) to show that there is a new way to be, both in this life and beyond our own lifetimes. It's a lot to take in I know. But it's at the heart of the Christian faith, showing God's unbreakable love for us, through death and resurrection, cross and empty tomb. It's not about how good we can be at all, but rather, how good God is. Finally, we come to this weeks verse from the Bible:

## bible: `I am the vine; you are the branches.' John 15.5

There are lots of reasons why Jesus uses this image but for us it has one key connection to make. Christians believe that by putting their trust in Jesus, acknowledging and saying sorry for their wrongdoing and following him means that they are restored in their relationship with him. All things then flow from that. We become part of him, we are in him, like grafted on branches are part of the vine. To put it another way he is not just a bridge that links God and people, but a person through whom they can be united. He is the vine, we are the branches, made possible by all he did for us and his plan is that we are to be fruitful.
