

## Announcement from the Rector



## **Steve writes ...**

... of shoes - and ships - and sealingwax/ - of cabbages - and kings\*

I write having just returned from a week's holiday in Brittany. Now this isn't quite as relaxing as it sounds: not only was the purpose to spend time with our four grandchildren aged 2 to 9, but all the Covid-related regulations were quite stressful. However, we are very grateful for being able to see our family after a year's separation.



While I was away, I heard continuing reports of the Taliban's capture and occupation of provinces, towns and cities of Afghanistan until, yesterday, they entered Kabul. As I write, the British, the Americans and others are desperately trying to evacuate their own citizens and many Afghans who assisted them over the past twenty years. To the latter group, in particular, we owe our every effort to provide a safe exit and resettlement, away from the very real possibility of deadly reprisals by the Taliban. The debate over why the democratically elected regime was unable to successfully defend itself against the Taliban insurgents will undoubtedly rage for some time; there is plenty of blame to go around. In the immediate future our prayer must be that our governments do whatever they can to protect those most vulnerable to Taliban reprisals. Pray, too, that the Taliban itself will have a more tolerant stance toward ethnic and religious minorities, women and girls, than it did when last in power throughout the 1990's and that they realise that allowing their country to become a base from which extremist groups attack the West is counterproductive.

July and August have witnessed extreme temperatures in the west of North America, Southern Europe, North Africa and the Middle East, leading to a series of devastating wildfires. At the same time, there have been torrential rains causing damage and deadly flooding in Germany, Belgium, China and Japan. Very few people now disagree with the view that these disturbing and dangerous developments are due to climate change, linked to human activity. These catastrophes may serve to shake some out of complacency.

Climate change is not something which might happen in the distant future somewhere far away, but it is happening now and it is happening just

across the Channel. Please pray that the UN Climate Change Conference (COP26) to be held in Glasgow (31 October to 12 November) may serve to stiffen the resolve of governments to take the necessary steps to achieve already-set goals in reducing carbon emissions. However, in democratic countries, governments can only successfully implement those policies which have public support. May we as followers of Jesus be willing to make the changes, large and small, necessary to protect the good creation our Father God has entrusted to us. This willingness to change our behaviour will be the most significant offering we can make, as we approach the season of gratitude and celebration in Harvest Thanksgiving.

This will be chaired by the Patronage Secretary of the Church Pastoral Aid Society (CPAS) and Archdeacon Gordon Steele in order to give guidance to the PCCs on the process of appointing your next incumbent.



I hope you've spotted that there are already a fair number of people who contribute material to grapevine or work behind the scenes.

Short pieces of local or particular interest are good - preferably sent as a Word doc with minimal formatting - as are book reviews, and any relevant items spotted online you think might interest others – but there are no guarantees it will be included. Just attach or include the web address and a note of what struck you as relevant in an email to me - missjudecurtis@btinternet.com - or, once the embargo on 'physical' bits of paper is lifted, leave a note in church with my name on it.

If you organise events, **never** take for granted that I can read your mind – particularly now when communication still tends not to be face-to-face. It goes without saying I can read your mind if we *are* face-to-face!

The 'production values' have improved immeasurably since we first went to an A5 format – researched and meticulously planned alongside Margaret Akroyd in winter 2004 and launched with the fanfare February 2005 edition.

A lot of pages then still had the distinctive fuzziness of a WWII *Gestetner* running on empty. Carefully curated photos from my trips to Syria in 2005 and 2007 now look like ink-blots. You would never know 'The Street Called Straight' really is straight!

Full colour wasn't seen until 2008 with a one-off visual of a tractor on the cover in September – must have been 'Harvest'. There was also a 4 page colour insert covering John Allen's trip to Chile around then too.

It was the imminent arrival of Steve that inspired the cover of March 2009 and hastened the 'full colour cover' becoming standard by late 2011 with the help of a donated Canon printer. This coincided with the arrival of The

Back Page and has its own loyal band of faithful contributors of colour images and photography.

A year or so later and the move to a 'proper' office with a grown-up printing and collating machine and the editor working from home [thank you!] has made all the difference, with the office faithfully churning out a mammoth print run in record time every month.

Just to give you an idea of what would be welcomed with open arms...

You could express appreciation for an event you've attended and enjoyed: or, dare I say, a sermon you've found challenging, but also anything you've spotted that is comforting, thought-provoking or hits a spot that you didn't know existed before you read it.

Prayers that have stuck with you, or seem particularly appropriate are equally welcome. Feedback for organisers and leaders is like water to the parched and makes the agonising, late-night decision-making worthwhile for me included. Feedback – even the negative variety – is always useful. One regular correspondent picking up on my hesitation in an Editorial a while back as to whether the term 'Bag Lady' was intrinsically discriminatory and chose to target the 'lady' component rather than 'bag', though whether this was a comment on gender equality or I suspect accuracy when applied to me, [thankfully] wasn't entirely clear. You will see in paragraph 2 I have carefully opted for One Person Band instead of One Man Band just to be on the safe side.

A recent, daunting 'Monday-of-grapevine-week' - was made so much easier by an email brimming with praise for the latest edition, from someone who'd discovered grapevine for the first time on our website and for whom references to the notorious Ballast Hole struck a personal chord. Oh, yes, and is, obviously, as daft about footpaths as I am. Anything that mentions Corvids or footpaths has my immediate attention!

In the months to come we are all going to need some extra help handling and preparing for change. Now is the time to be thinking - "What could I do to help?" not, 'How can I wriggle out . . .?"

This is the bit where I have to follow my own advice ...



## Book Review

# Russ Parker, Forgiveness is Healing [Daybreak (DLT)]

This book was first published in 1993. It is an excellent textbook on forgiveness.

The giving and receiving of forgiveness is so central to the Christian message that any follower of Jesus should school themselves in this ministry, which can bring healing and proclaim the Gospel in powerful ways. The importance of forgiveness is apparent when we remember the words of Jesus as the soldiers nailed him to his cross. "Father forgive" reminds us just how central forgiveness is in Jesus's words and actions.

As we think of Jesus on the cross we see so clearly that forgiveness has its costs. The author reminds us that this cost can come because in the very act of forgiving we must also let go of any hurt or sense of outrage that we have, because of what the other has done to us. To forgive another is to enter into a commitment to love them.

Forgiveness is not an easy process but once the door to



forgiving has been opened the results can be quite remarkable as Jesus demonstrates by that act of forgiveness on the cross.


There are chapters in this book on various aspects of forgiveness; in relation to salvation, forgiveness of individuals and healing of memories, and forgiveness within the life of the community.

There are also chapters on forgiveness in the context of deliverance ministry and the healing of the land. This latter chapter, written nearly 30 years age, speaks to us today as we confront climate change and ecological concerns.

Forgiveness is Healing offers us guidance for an important ministry at a time when there are so many wounds to be healed in our nation, in the post-Brexit and post- Covid 19 era.

I strongly recommend this book as we seek to construct the "new normal"

#### A Fond Farewell

his is the last magazine resource that I expect to write before my farewell service, which is due to be Evensong at the Cathedral on Sunday 31 October at 3.30 pm.

Necessary precautions permitting, I hope that will be an occasion when I might be able to see many of you in person, in a way that has not been possible recently.

The life of an archdeacon can be somewhat relentless (as. I hasten to recognise, can many other roles) and I have been conscious of diminishing stamina over the past couple of years and I no longer look exactly as I did in the 2012 photo that accompanies this letter - so it therefore seemed appropriate that, in this year in which I have become a pensioner, I should step aside and see the baton pass to someone younger (presumably!). Having made that decision some time ago. I have become increasingly aware of the fact that I will miss my role enormously.

Maria and I came to this diocese from London in 1994, first on my appointment as vicar of St Alban's. Northampton, where our son and daughter. Andrew and Elizabeth, were born. From there we moved to Peterborough in 2001, where I served first as vicar of the city centre parish of St John the Baptist, before I became archdeacon of the north-eastern half of the diocese in 2012. Just as it was a great honour to serve in those two parishes, so too has it been to serve as an archdeacon for the final stage of my stipendiary ministry. I have greatly enjoyed the visits I have been able to make over those years to so many of

the 170 parishes in the archdeaconry, whether on Sundays or during the week, and grateful for the warm welcomes I have received. The pandemic has made for a very odd final year and more, doing



virtually everything from my desk, with meetings and interviews on zoom rather than in the parishes.

As we enter what we hope will be a sustained period of greater normality, we thank God for one another, for the mutual support and cooperation that we have experienced and witnessed across the diocese and, indeed, throughout this land. We express our great gratitude to all who have been seeing us through this crisis, and not least the staff of the NHS, and we pray for all for whom this has been a particularly difficult or sad time, and for the many countries in the world that lack the considerable benefits which we enjoy.

Above all, let us continue to put our whole trust in God and seek to ever deepen our relationship with him, that we may be alert and responsive to his promptings, in all that he calls us to be and to do in the years ahead, whatever our circumstances. May he richly bless you as you continue onwards on your journey of Christian discipleship in worship, witness and service.

## ... from Godfrey Stone

For old times' sake, Dot and I recently paid a visit to Peterborough cathedral. 2021 is the Fortieth anniversary of my ordination. We were on our way to a week's holiday in East Anglia where, later, we popped in to see Vivienne Wilson.

Back in July 1981, I was due to give my first sermon at St Mary's. But our son had other ideas! Instead, I joined Dot in Kettering hospital for the birth of Philip. Some weeks later, we found ourselves at the Rectory for a baptism preparation evening, and we met another young mum called Yvonne. Dot and Yvonne became good friends, and after keeping in touch for the intervening years, it was a joy to see Yvonne (now surnamed Desroches) ordained priest this past summer, also in Peterborough.

Forty years on, Philip now towers over his mum - and lives in Hertfordshire with his Chinese wife and two daughters. Meanwhile our daughter Steph (also born while we were in Manor Road) lives in northern Scotland. She works in an Aberdeen hospital as a haematologist. Her husband is a creative design teacher, and they also have two daughters.

After following separate professional lives - Dot specialises in teaching English to international students - Dot and I are aiming in retirement to work together at joint projects. These include being grandparents to four girls, cultivating an allotment, helping to run a network for retired people in our current parish, and (for Godfrey) chairing the ecumenical Christian charity 'the Friends of the Church in China' [www.thefcc.org].

For over the forty years, I have regularly pondered the key text given during the retreat before the 1981 ordination: 'You have not chosen me, but I have chosen you ... so that you might go and bear fruit, fruit that will last.' (John 15. 16). But until this year's visit to Peterborough, I had not looked up to see the text inscribed on the cathedral ceiling over the high altar (under which I was ordained) - 'I am the Vine, ye are the branches' (from the beginning of John 15).

Perhaps one of the most significant things I began to learn in Rushden came through serving in both St Mary's and St Peter's, Midland Road. I discovered how neighbourhoods and communities differ from each other. I began to learn to meet the Lord in a wide range of different styles of



worship. But above all, I benefitted from becoming part of the Christian community in each place, and through that to hear the continual challenge of the Lord Jesus (John 1. 43, and 21.19): 'Follow me!'

Many other memories of Rushden come to mind (like unsuccessfully trying to bowl out

John Dixon in the parish cricket match; or David Clarke's fuchsia, that is still flowering 38 years on!).

With these and many other memories, we thank God for all we learned in Rushden. And we give thanks to you (and to some who are now in glory) for sharing your life-in-Christ with us at what was an important time for us as a family and, for me, at the start of the adventure of ordained ministry.


