

Linnet writes ...

Dear Friends

Soon another name will be added to the list of Rectors of St Mary's. The list is long! There has been a Rector of Rushden since 1230.

Some of us remember several of them. I remember Michael Wilson, Alan Smith, Barry

Morrison and, of course, Steve Prior. All four of them were godly men. All of them led us well and cared for us lovingly. And all four were different and blessed us in different ways.

But none of them was perfect!

And our new Rector will follow in their footsteps and in the footsteps of the fifty six men who served the church and the town as Rector before him - but he won't be perfect! Because none of us is perfect.

The only perfect person to have ever lived is Jesus, and when we compare ourselves with Him, we have to admit that we are not perfect - we are human beings with faults and failings.

This might sound like bad news, but it is not! Several wonderful things are also true ...

The Bible teaches us that God loves us and accepts us as we are despite our imperfection. It was for imperfect women and men that Jesus died, demonstrating God's amazing love for all human beings. God knows us through and through and still loves us to bits!!

God is at work in us to bring us to perfection, to re-make us in the likeness of Jesus. That is the work of the Holy Spirit whose coming we celebrate in a few weeks. As we cooperate with Him, He changes us and makes us more like Jesus. We don't just sit back and accept our imperfections: we ask for forgiveness for them and work with God's help to overcome them.

And as we hope that other people accept us and our faults, so we learn to accept other people, allowing for their foibles. Remember that Jesus told us not to try to take a speck of dust out of someone else's eye, while there is a plank in our own eye. And if we find the speck in their eye irritating, the



answer is to pray for them and ask God to help us to see them as He does, as a much loved son or daughter.

I recently saw the film 'Phantom of the Open', the story of Maurice Flitcroft, 'the worst golfer in the world'. He scored the highest ever score in the British Open in 1965, never having played a round of golf before. His motto was, "The road to perfection is practise." We are not going to be perfect until we reach heaven but let's seek to practise in the here and now as we experience God's acceptance, love and forgiveness and the power of the Holy Spirit and let's practise offering that love to other people.

Our response to Ukraine ...

On **Wednesday 13 April** a few people met in church to discuss how we can respond to the ongoing situation in Ukraine.

To keep it as simple as possible, we thought the best way forward would be to partner with groups or charities, who are further down the road in their support and relief efforts. A number of people have contacts with individuals or groups who are already involved, so they are going to speak to those contacts and report back to the group in 2-3 weeks' time, so that we can continue to discern where and how best to respond.

We know that many people have contributed financially already, but if you want to make a donation there are a couple of recommended organisations to go to. Please speak to Paul or Kate to find out which those are.

Please also read the following extracts from a Testimony written by a Pastor in Ukraine, about the amazing things that God is doing there! It is written by a colleague who spent three years in the same class at Kyiv Bible Institute.

"The Pastor concerned also met his wife at the Bible College, and they and their four children live in Bucha: experiencing the first two weeks of Russian occupation.

"... They saw and felt huge explosions nearby in Hostomel, and ... over thirty helicopters full of Russian Special Forces landing, and in the main street of Bucha. They were hoping it would all be over soon: that Russia would realise that they were causing so much suffering, or that the West would intervene. Instead it just got worse and worse. They saw houses bombed everywhere: even the house next door was set on fire by an explosion.

"Because they had a cellar about fifteen neighbours came to shelter with them ... But they got much more than physical shelter!

"Every day, and often a few times a day, they prayed and recited Psalm 91 [the ultimate promise of God's protection] and they sang. When a rocket landed in their garden a few metres from the house, it DID NOT explode. Everyone literally saw God's protection.

"In the first week Russians destroyed the phone masts, so they had no signal. The situation was getting worse every day. On a single working phone they heard official announcements about green corridors for civilians. One



day the message was that people should go to the Central Train Station and there would be buses to collect them. But the Pastor prayed for the Lord's guidance and reassurance and, miraculously, his phone rang: a fellow Pastor from Irpin. He told them to go towards Irpin not to the train station. Completely the opposite direction!

"In four minutes they were ready to leave with a few necessities. They walked through streets littered with rubble, burnt tanks and corpses of


Russian soldiers, while neighbours were crying and asking them to stay as the family seemed to be the last hope people had. They went in the opposite direction to everyone else: crossed a broken bridge and found Ukrainian soldiers waiting for them. They were safe!

"Later they discovered that all the buses full of people trying to escape Bucha were forced to turn back by the Russians. Their fervent desire for all of us is to keep our prayer life alive: don't let fear win, and trust the Word of God. His Word is full of living, genuine promise!"

Ukraine war risks millions starving elsewhere

"Don't make us take food from children that are hungry to give to children that are starving," pleads the UN's **World Food Programme** (WFP).

Soaring food and fuel costs, together with budget cuts in some traditional donor countries, have forced the WFP to halve the amount of food it is giving to millions of people in Yemen, Chad and Niger.

In December 2021, the UN made a record appeal for \$41bn (£31bn) to help 273 million people this year.

As aid workers stress, these are not people who will be made a bit more comfortable by help from the UN. They are people, particularly children, who will probably die without it. But that appeal was made before Russia invaded Ukraine. Both countries used to sell grain to the WFP.

Introducing the Archdeacon of Oakham

n 6 February 2022, I became the Archdeacon of Oakham, living in Peterborough and serving the parishes of 6 Deaneries – Peterborough, Oundle, Higham, Kettering, Corby and Rutland. I must be new as I'm still counting my time in weeks – rather than months!

This is not a part of the world which I know as I've spent the last 10 years as the Vicar of between 5 and 9 villages in East Leicestershire. which I really enjoyed, I was near the retreat house. Launde Abbev. shared between Leicester and Peterborough Dioceses, so I still feel at home when I go to Launde Abbey, although life generally now has less village life about it. less in the way of fetes and village events, less working out how to get the large Christmas Tree into the small Church building and less sheep from my upstairs windows.

I am someone who loves being outside, particularly in the countryside. I'm happiest when walking long distances – a good day is about 15 miles on a fresh, sunny and not too hot day – if there is a coffee and cake somewhere then so much the better. On the rare occasion that the weather is too wild for me to be outside (I really do most weathers – all you need is good kit!) then I can be found at my sewing machine – I made my daughter's prom dress with her and the

waistcoats for my youngest son's wedding with him as well as one or two jackets for myself which you'll spot me wearing when I'm out and about



I'm settling into Archdeacon's life and getting out into our parishes. Being out on a Sunday morning and midweek evenings meeting people is one of my favourite parts of the role.

I have a heart for Mission - having a background particularly in Mission and Evangelism with young people, and in rural places. I enjoy leading collective worship in schools and there's nothing better than the danger of standing in front of a primary school class and asking 'any questions?'

I am looking forward to the places I will get to visit in the next few months with all their variety, and the people I will be meeting – I am sure there will be exciting new places, challenging new questions and things I can't even imagine!

Book Review

Mere Christianity by C S Lewis, Fontana [1952]

I suspect that in most people's minds today C S Lewis's name will be associated with his popular Narnia books. For discerning Christians the library of books that he wrote on the Christian subjects of apologetics, ethics and theology, in which he addressed topics related to belief and Christian conduct, may be even more treasured than his fables.

I read this book for the first time nearly 50 years ago. In my opinion it speaks to seeking minds as powerfully and relevantly today as it did when it was first published in 1952. The book has its origins in a series of talks by the author that were broadcast by the BBC during World War II.

In the Preface Lewis claims that what he has written is a defence of the belief that has been common to nearly all Christians at all times. He expresses his view that theological disputation should be confined to those who have already come to believe that there is one God and that Jesus Christ is his only Son. Lewis believed that discussion of disputed theological points has no tendency at all to bring an outsider into the Christian fold: a warning that would seem to be relevant at a

time when making disciples is such a difficult task in the secular society in which we find ourselves.

Mere Christianity comes in four parts: Right and Wrong; What Christians Believe; Christian Behaviour and The Doctrine of the Trinity. In less than 200 pages Lewis leads the reader through the core traditional teachings of the Church.

I recommend this book as a trustworthy textbook for anyone entering into the process of conversion and commitment to the Christian faith, but it can equally provide a "refresher course" for any believer who feels under pressure from the secular world view that tends to dominate our society and which expects us to dance to its tune. Mental Health Chaplaincy

Richard Kellow joined St Andrew's Healthcare in Northampton as an Honorary Chaplaincy Assistant in May 2021 and has recently been appointed as a Mental Health Chaplain with Northamptonshire Healthcare NHS Trust (NHFT).

He writes: "I had been ordained in the Church of England for eight years when I had a period of poor mental health which ultimately led me to re-evaluate my life and its direction. Out of that ... came a calling to Chaplaincy. As part of my course ... I undertook a 200 hour placement at St Andrew's Healthcare. I'll be totally honest, I was somewhat apprehensive about doing my placement there - mainly because I thought my calling was to acute healthcare chaplaincy ... But St Andrew's Lead Chaplain, Philip Evans, immediately said they would be delighted to have me! So that was it . . . I'm enormously grateful to St Andrew's for the experience I've gained and all that I have learned. I have found satisfaction in pretty much every minute of my time there – from a wonderful group of chaplains hugely committed to the patients that they care for, to the wide variety of patients that I have met and had the privilege of walking alongside ... from the very dedicated teams of staff that care for patients day in day out on the wards, to the multidisciplinary teams of professionals who strive to work together for the good of the patients. I have found St Andrew's to be a place of care and hope, even in very difficult circumstances.

Chaplaincy is often misunderstood. [Basically] Chaplains are there to connect with both staff and patients of faith and no faith through the ups and downs of life... We also run services and pray for people, but chaplaincy is so much more that 'just' those things: it's helping people to find peace, connection and meaning, often at a time when those things are extremely hard to find. Spiritual care makes a significant positive impact on mental health ... and through it all I have found that the desire for human connection runs very deep indeed – through confusion, through past abuse, through past mistakes. In many senses I don't think it would be an exaggeration to say that it feels as though I have had more pastoral impact in my time at St Andrew's than the rest of my ordained ministry put together."

So, thank you St Andrew's and thank you to all of the patients that I have had the privilege of walking alongside




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
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Looking Back at Parish Magazines



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
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Belfry Gossip

It came as a huge blow to James and his family to learn that the King's Lynn Centre of Evangelism was being shut down through lack of funding. James was deeply concerned for the young people that he had been mentoring and who needed continuing support to face the difficulties in their lives. You may remember his vision and passion as he spoke to us about his desire to see Jesus glorified in King's Lynn. How hard it must have been for him to let go of his ministry there!

Now, though, Church Army has given James a new assignment, in the Chantry and Pinewood Estates in Ipswich. At present, he is still finding out more about the shape his new ministry will take.

He will still be working among young people of secondary school age, and his vision is to help develop new Christian communities among them, in school and outside school, forging links with the local church.

James' work in Ipswich is not such a pioneer ministry as the one in King's Lynn. He trusts that he will be able to meet with pupils at the secondary school, Chantry Academy, and at Suffolk One, the Sixth Form College connected to it. There is a school chaplain, and a youth worker from James' own church, St Francis', who are already meeting with 15-20 young people who have no church background, some of whom are looking into the Christian faith.

James has been very grateful for our prayers and support for him and his family over these past challenging months. He, Laura and Sam and Becky are all doing well now. Please do pray for them all, and for the Lord to guide and enable James as he shares God's love with young people in Ipswich.
