Just as steeples and spires used to guide people around the countryside, I look forward to being part of a place where the church can still be a witness to the community, pointing to God and guiding people with his Good News through a confusing landscape of many ups and downs.

Teenage Angst ...

Much as I love poetry I'm getting increasingly bad at delving into my long term memory banks to retrieve quotations. Beyond the opening lines of G K Chesterton's 'Lepanto' - but that belongs to another story entirely - the first quotation I can conjure up at a stroke is, rather weirdly, from D H Lawrence's The End.



Sometime during my somewhat frustrated teenage years I seem to have adopted it as a working mantra. I only went back to check on it yesterday and I seem to have transposed it into first person rather than third person, and largely misremembered both context and content. Despite that I'm perfectly capable of conjuring up this corrupted version, whilst having no idea where I left my new reading glasses. Isn't cataract surgery such a mixed blessing? One friend now refers to it as her 'catapult op'.

Ever the drama queen I remember around the age of 15 deciding to become an academic, for the entirely laudable reason that they get the longest holidays. If you put together an unblinking demand for personal freedom, self-determination and a mind-set geared towards saving the world, it is a miracle that I ended up back at St Mary's after a gap of well over thirty years with an embarrassingly varied set of life skills and academic qualifications and absolutely no idea of what being a Christian actually entailed.

Since some of them are still alive and still attend St Mary's it would be both inflammatory and probably physically foolhardy to blame any of that on my Sunday School teachers. Neither did I have any idea that YPF was meant to further my religious education: I thought it was simply a social club and certainly used it as such.

But the culture shock of university life was profound and inevitably defined the Church as an alien and uncomfortable world of set rituals and socially acceptable behaviour which I'd already rejected, while the real world around me was more politicised and divisive than I'd ever imagined as a child. "And have not longer any hope To heal the suffering, or to make requite, For all your life of asking and despair I own that some of me is dead tonight" D. H. Lawrence, Selected Poems, Penguin, 1966 [1950]*

So, thank you, Father God, for Alpha in particular, for totally rearranging my brain, and also for the provision of new generations of clergy and lay ministers whose patience and knowledge continue to amaze me. In my case they come from a whole range of denominational backgrounds and styles of worship. A while back I was quite fiercely drawn to the Pentecostal mind set of another Acorn Christian Listening Tutor - particularly the emphasis on songs: on a bad day, when our church is definitely not singing off the same hymn sheet, the silence of the Quakers becomes seriously appealing. The winter migration to The Church of Scotland for many years gave me yet another perspective on worship and belief.

The bottom line is, though, that wherever and whatever churchmanship I embrace, it's irrelevant. Since 30 March 2000 I cannot, whatever happens, say, with any truth, "I have not longer any hope"! It's the complete opposite.

St Mary's Ladies' Group ... met again on Wednesday 8 June and we were indeed fortunate to have the very enthusiastic Events Coordinator of The Chester House Estate, Tom Jolley, to speak. He gave an extremely detailed account of how this local tourist attraction came into being.

His timeline indicated the transformation the site has undergone since 2004, when it was bought by the [then] NCC, and included both triumphs and setbacks - especially when the house itself burnt down in 2010! Using an insurance pay out and funding from the National Lottery Heritage Fund, restoration was completed in October 2021, and the site now offers many facilities and attractions - as well as its primary purpose as a Roman Archaeological 'living' Dig. The site itself tells what Tom described as, 'A 10,000 year old story'.

Some members present had already visited and agreed Chester House makes an excellent day out! The facilities include shops, a beautiful café and free car parking - although Tom agreed access still leaves much to be desired, particularly the safety issues associated with leaving the site and accessing the A45. He encouraged us all to write letters to the appropriate authorities asking for improvements!

Its Education and Community Department also opens up the site to learning - interns are part of the staff. There is also a School for Young Adults with individual needs with encouragement through Job Counselling and it is also a new venue for Adult Education provision. Altogether a very interesting afternoon: supported by Christina on piano, Maureen's prayers and Cynthia's introduction and Bible reading. Ann Smith & Jude Curtis

Food for thought and prayer

BRF (Bible Reading Fellowship) Bible reading notes – why bother? the following statement from BRF:

It's said that if a ballet dancer doesn't practise for one day, she notices. If she doesn't practise for two days, the class notices and if she doesn't practise for three days, the whole audience notices. It might not be so immediately obvious if Christians don't read the Bible every day but, sooner or later, it will be noticed.

Different Christian traditions give different weight to the habit of daily Bible study, but all are agreed that it's an important discipline: a practice to be fostered, along with prayer, worship, reflection and service, if faith is to grow deep roots.

Our enthusiasm for Bible reading may wax and wane: life becomes busy or difficult, we drift away and don't know how to return, scripture no longer seems to 'speak' to us, we get bored, distracted or discouraged until daily Bible study becomes a joyless 'ought', another niggly, guilt-inducing 'should'.

But what if, instead of thinking of it as a duty, we think of it as a gift: a

lovely opportunity to sit in God's presence, focus on his word and keep the channels of communication open?

Daily Bible reading notes nourish and inspire on good days, but they come into their own when we're flagging. They provide a structure, a manageable passage of scripture and the thoughts of a wise, compassionate and experienced commentator.'

Bible readings are for all ages to grow in faith and understanding of the Bible.

There are many books to choose from Guidelines, Daily Readings, Bible Reflections and more. Current yearly prescription is £14.55 for 3 books throughout the year.

God's Church for God's World

The Lambeth Conference 2022

A fter a two-year postponement I'm looking forward to this summer's Lambeth Conference when hundreds of Anglican bishops from around the world will gather at Canterbury for prayer, bible study, conversation, fellowship and sharing (July 26th -August 7th). We are hoping to welcome our three link bishops from Korea. During the event, we will discuss various topics, including mission and evangelism, peace and reconciliation, the environment and sustainable development, discipleship and inter faith relations.

In preparation, over the past year I have been part of two online groups, meeting monthly with bishops from Australia, Bangladesh, Brazil, Canada, Chad, the Congo, Egypt, India, Ireland, Mauritius, Melanesia, New Zealand, Pakistan, Scotland, South Africa, Sudan, Tanzania and the West Indies. It's been wonderful to begin some very rich new friendships and reconnect with old friends.

The overall theme is "God's Church for God's world" and the three major strands, which match the Archbishop of Canterbury's priorities are; reconciliation (walking together), evangelism (witnessing together) and prayer (listening together).

In our bible studies we will be reflecting on the First Letter of Peter. I'm very happy to recommend the excellent conference study guide co-written by scholars from around the world (1 Peter Commentary edited by Jenn Strawbridge).

Archbishop Justin has called us to pray: "The Conference theme of 'God's

Church for God's World', reminds us that we are called upon as Christians to pray for the needs of the world. There are many calls



upon our prayers at this time: World peace, the global climate crisis, the effects of the pandemic – to name but a few. I invite you to call all those in your care to pray for the Lambeth Conference. Please pray that as we meet and consider our shared mission and ministry, that we may hear the call from God. In turn, that we might add our voices to call others to make a difference for Christ in the world."

There is a really helpful prayer guide for those wanting to support the conference, easily downloadable from the Conference website.

Pour down upon us, O God, the gifts of your Holy Spirit, that those who prepare for the Lambeth Conference may be filled with wisdom and understanding.

May they know at work within them that creative energy and vision which belong to our humanity, made in your image and redeemed by your love, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen

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Good to Know ...

Peace of mind when going on holiday

Make sure your



- home looks occupied. Ask a trusted neighbour or friend to look after your home e.g. push mail through letter box, water plants, feed pets etc. Let them have the spare keys but don't put your name/address on them.
- Don't leave curtains closed in the daytime. Use automatic timer-switches to turn lights on when it goes dark. Cancel regular deliveries such as newspapers or milk. Avoid discussing holiday plans where strangers may hear your plans to be away.
- Cut the lawn before you go and trim back any plants that burglars could hide behind. Consider leaving important documents and valuables with family members, a bank or in a safe. Don't put your home address on your luggage when travelling to a holiday destination.
- Consider putting valuable items from shed or garage, like bikes, into the house and avoid putting

valuables on view from the window such as TV, laptop, DVD player etc.

Photograph all valuables items as a record, make sure household insurance is up-todate. Remember to lock all external doors and windows, pull out plugs, cooker off. If you have a burglar alarm, make sure it is set. Last check for passports, tickets or other documentation.

Book Review - Tony Smith

Free to Fail by Russ Parker

Triangle SPCK, 1998 'Everyone fails – including Christians who have been touched by the healing power of God'. This insightful comment is printed on the cover of this book.

Russ also writes, 'I have learned to accept that not every failure is explained and that *not knowing why* is something we have to live with. The important thing is to walk with God and stay open to him. The purpose of this book is to explore our experiences of failure as Christians and to see some of the ways God has called us to handle this'.

In **Free to Fail** we are given insights into how by God's grace we are free to fail. Experiencing failure is not the worst experience we can have. We are invited to explore some of the pressures to succeed that are to be found among Christians, and to see if there is a Gospel which embraces and, to some degree, makes sense of failure.

Russ has spent many years as a leader in the healing ministry of the church, both in the UK and abroad. I have known him for 30 years and on occasions have had the privilege of sharing ministry with him and learning much from him. His wide experience of healing ministry enables him to speak with authority on many aspects of that ministry and in this book he explains how a wrongly understood and practised healing ministry, that is not based on a sound understanding of Scripture, can be so destructive and harmful.

For example he is critical of forms of healing ministry where healing is separated from a wider proclamation of the Gospel, a practice contrary to Biblical teaching (see Luke 9). Where expectations and the promise of success are unrealistic this can result in making challenging situations worse by engendering feelings of guilt and despair when prayer appears, to all concerned, to end in failure. A quotation from a Ugandan Christian Russ met who was badly disfigured after being severely injured by guerrillas can help to put failure into a Christian perspective: "God never promises us an easy time. Just safe arrival". It is surely salutary to heed Russ's comment that the Bible is full of failures as well as triumphs. This is the real world in which we are called to live as true disciples of Jesus.

When, last September, the Williams family moved to the Czech Republic they could not foresee how coming events in Eastern Europe would impact so many lives or that refugees from the war in Ukraine would be fleeing to Brno and even living next door to them. As all of this took place, Lea and Petra prayed that the Lord would use them in whatever way he chose to help those who had been displaced. Since then, Petra has been working with an organisation which distributes clothes, toiletries and other essentials to the refugees. The Williams children, Olivia and Ted, have made friends with the Ukrainian children next door, who come to play with them and their rabbit and hamsters. The language barrier does not seem to get in the way!

Meanwhile, Lea and Petra have been praising the Lord for answers to prayer. He has given them the ideal meeting place which they needed. The first service held there was on Easter Sunday and was a wonderful occasion. New people, especially international students, are joining them. Then, after postponements and a long wait, Lea was licensed on May 15th. And, also in answer to prayer, Olivia and Ted are very much enjoying attending a local school which is experienced in integrating children from other nationalities, and have already made strong friendships there.

It's so good to see how the Lord is working through Lea and Petra and their family. They tell us how thankful they are for our prayers and our friendship. It really is a privilege and a joy for us to be linked with them and to stand with them as they serve him in a spiritually needy part of the world.



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
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Belfry Gossip
