Tom writes ...

Greetings once again during this Lenten season.

And for Easter: Hallelujah!

Having written about the conflation of Epiphany, Lent and Easter in the last Newsletter I now find myself facing up to Lent, Easter and, indeed, Pentecost at the same



time. On the face of things, these are very different topics. Ordinarily we would work our way through the process of these seasons because the passage of time helps us to mark the transition from penitence to celebration. Yet to speak of them together recognises that we observe Lent as a means of *ordering* time, and not because it reflects the end of the matter.

Observing Lent – focussing on our nature as sinful human beings, devoid of goodness on our own merit – does not mean the resurrection of Jesus has ceased to be sufficient. However, celebrating Easter – as we are wont to do every day as Christians, and certainly every Sunday as we gather as the church – does not mean we can avoid remaining in a sinful and broken world.

Many generations of Christians have come and gone since Jesus rose from the dead. Throughout that time some have made the focus of faith Jesus' suffering, obedience, and sorrow – to the point of denying joy and the power of forgiveness and freedom. Others have made that focus the exuberant, extravagant excitement and triumph that the resurrection reveals. We do, of course, need an awareness of both.

Our sin is sometimes seen most clearly for what it is, not in acts of great evil, but in small choices where all such evil begins – the insidious conviction of our own righteousness, and the desire for our own will, not God's, to prevail.

Lent is a season to recall our sin and our need of God's grace and forgiveness at every level of our lives. The glorious truth of Easter is that the Lord's death is sufficient! It is through God's own sacrifice, the death of Jesus and not our own, that we may come into this freedom. Jesus' resurrection declares that the consequences of our sin have been met in his own Person. Jesus has made a way out of darkness, into God's marvellous light, that we might live with him always. Happy Easter! Tom

Summary of PCC meeting held on Monday 13 March 2023 at 7.00pm

20 members attended. Minutes of the January 9 meeting were approved, with some minor amendments. Matters arising included updates on risk assessments progress and Stewardship Sunday outcomes. Accounts were presented, discussed and agreed.

We are an Easter people – and Alleluia is our song!

ome of us may be better than others in fasting during Lent. For some shaping the liturgical mood of our services to mark the contrast with Easter involves a kind of fast - subdued colours, no flowers, restrained hymns and most especially not using the word "Alleluia" until the first celebration of the resurrection. This might sound a bit fussy and contrived but the eruption of sound at the Cathedral's Easter Vigil, as we move from darkness to light, with the organ thundering, bells ringing and the Choir in full voice singing Alleluia is an astonishingly powerful and thrilling moment

Of course, the first Easter wasn't a moment of celebration. Numbed by grief, fearful for their own lives, it caught Jesus' friends by surprise. Mary Magdalene and her companions, Peter and John and Thomas; for all that Jesus had taught, the news of his rising left them bewildered, uncertain, even afraid.

It's easy for us to get stuck in a sense of failure, defeat and denial. There is little to lighten our mood in a world torn apart by violence, with people struggling to make ends meet, against a backdrop of climate change and fears for the environment. Meanwhile our beloved Church is not only struggling to connect with the communities it serves, but finds itself preoccupied with internal (I nearly said eternal) debates over prayers for same-sex couples.

But it is into this world and this Church - the world as it truly is - that the good news of Jesus Christ comes. His saving death, his bursting from the tomb; this changes everything, and once we take a

moment to reflect on it, brings Alleluia to our lips. For if all the powers of darkness could not silence God's Son, nor extinguish



the light of Christ, what have we to fear?
The seventeenth century poet George
Herbert - himself no stranger to anxiety
and depression - writes exultantly about
his experience of Easter in words
brilliantly set to music by Vaughn
Williams in his Five Mystical Songs. If
you don't know the piece why not look it
up – and as you do let Alleluias resound
in your heart:

Rise heart; thy Lord is risen.
Sing his praise
Without delays,
Who takes thee by the hand,
that thou likewise
With him mayst rise:
That as his life calcined thee to dust,
His life may make thee gold,
and much more just.

Church Army - "Faith shared in words and actions."

In 1882, the Rev Wilson Carlile founded Church Army to minister to the needy inhabitants of the Westminster slums. Now, in 2023, its members' vision is still the same - to share the Good News of Jesus in words and actions.

It's good to hear that our Mission Partner, James Hawksworth, is encouraged in his ministry as Pioneer Evangelist in the Suffolk Centre of Mission in Ipswich. A group of 15-20 young people, who have no background in Christianity, are continuing to meet every week at "Kintsugi Café", and some of them meet again on a Sunday evening. Although, as yet, not all would say that they are Christians they are seriously exploring the faith.

A further encouragement is that the local college, Suffolk One, has allowed James to run lunch clubs and wellbeing spaces for the students. James says, "I love this type of work! Bringing people together in a supportive, caring way that encourages healing and wholeness. Isn't this Jesus all over, isn't this the type of community he sought!"

Please pray that God will continue his work in the lives of these young people, and that he will give James further opportunities to share the Gospel in words and actions in Ipswich.

Belfry Gossip

At our Tower AGM - as well as receiving reports of last year's activities and electing officers for this year - we discussed our aims for 2023. Five people came and Cathy gave them a go at ringing the backstroke. One had rung before and is now a great help on Sundays, three of the others are progressing week by week. Well done to all. Also, since the last we report, we rang a quarter peal of one of the new methods - All Saints Doubles.

The Branch AGM was held here at Rushden with 38 members attending. Afternoon ringing was followed by tea and the meeting, where reports of last year were given, new members elected and officers for this year elected - the only changes were a new Ringing Master and Assistant. The programme of venues for the monthly ringing was presented, and accepted, subject to permissions. There was also a short discussion about the Guild's options for accommodating the towers from the Thrapston Branch, as the Branch no longer has enough ringers to be viable.

A different kind of Christingle at Candlemas 29 January – "It was with some reluctance that I arrived at church on 29 January 29 for the joint Christingle Service (my first mistake). The church was almost full already and the atmosphere was buzzing (my first surprise). Sadly I declined to accept an orange (my second mistake!)

Linnet and Tom soon got the service underway - and I quickly regretted my lack of an orange. It was obviously going to be fun! The sharing of the paper bags of resources (red tape, cocktail sticks, raisins, candles, knives and scissors) added to the sense of co-operation. When it came to lighting the completed Christingles, it struck me that the people walking round with tapers did not need to light many – because people were passing their flames along the pew to their neighbour. Just as faith is often passed on.

When all the candles were alight and the electric lights switched off, the effect was stunning.

All in all, a truly joyful experience. We concluded with learning an amazing new song, The Lighthouse, the actions of which were a real 'work out' By now all inhibitions gone and there was a real sense of unity and happiness - a joint service indeed."

Those Doors . . . At Last!!!

The South Porch of our magnificent church has been graced with beautiful oak doors and a glazed window in the West wall. It was crafted superbly by Rushden carpenters Woodward Joinery and gifted to St Mary's as the final contribution from 'The Friends of St Mary's Charitable Trust' after 13 years of



fundraising supported by church members, many townsfolk and local businesses. St Mary's is Rushden's oldest structure, dating from the 13th century and has been a focal point of so many lives and events during that time.

For the last 50 years this porch had a temporary barrier of hardboard fronted by old wrought iron gates, placed there out of necessity to protect workmen's tools as they repaired the tower, but hardly fitting on a Grade One listed building. Whether you remember it pre-1950s when this was used as a church entrance, or you only recall its ugly covering of recent decades, or especially if you are a newcomer and have yet to see it, do take a walk round the exterior and have a look. I recall an incident a few years ago when I was a church warden, seeing a bridal party trying to get photographs taken with the trees and lawn of this area and the ancient doorway as a framework, only to be disappointed and move to the west steps. Trivial concern maybe but it registered with me.

The winter months are not that productive but the decoration of the Christmas tree is always a highlight and last Christmas I was grateful that Gill and Hilary, our two youngest gardeners, were able to show their agility and artistic talent because they are the only ones who are allowed up a ladder to reach the top of the tree. We also had to enlist the youth of the church (Paul Adams) to put up the lanterns for carols by candlelight.

After Christmas gardening started again and we attempted to remove some of the ivy from the gardeners' shed although this is not obvious as there is rather a lot of it. We have been able to cut the Garden of Rest grass and have pruned all the fuchsias and about half the rose bushes. We even continued to prune roses when it snowed although it was a bit "parky". Hopefully the rose trees will not be upset by this. The hyacinths are beginning to show and so are the blue bells, even in the places where we had removed them. The two apple trees which were set last year appear to be thriving and the flowering cherry near the west gate has blossom. In preparation for the summer, we have set bedding plant seeds and tomato seeds so look forward to a good display later in the year.

Unfortunately, we are not getting any younger and are finding that as much as we enjoy the gardening Wednesday afternoons are for recovering from the morning's work. We would be so pleased if anyone would like to join us on a Wednesday morning. Gardening skills are not essential and you always get a coffee break.
