Tom King writes ...

Greetings! I hope that you had a pleasant Summer and were able to find time to celebrate the blessings of good weather and good company. As we roll on into Autumn, here at St. Mary's we are looking to strengthen and develop our existing church ministries, and also have various things happening to help renew our discipleship and encourage our



fellowship. On September 10, together as a church we embarked on a journey through the Gospel of Luke. We will be using this as our primary text on Sunday mornings – with appropriate breaks for festival seasons and certain other occasions – until Pentecost 2025. By working our way through the whole story, as Luke presents it, we will perhaps rediscover some less well-known corners, and together shape ourselves around Jesus and his coming Kingdom.

We are able to see this transformation take place in all the practical ministries of the church, our Tea and Coffee gatherings on Thursdays, our Ladies' Group and Craft Group, the Bumps and Babes toddler group and other family ministry such as the monthly Dad's event; also our involvement with the foodbank, the recovery project, and the local schools. All of these are where we can bless others in need by sharing the love of God that he has already shown to us, and in serving others become more like Jesus ourselves. We have also this month begun a short, three-session course on being ready to share the reasons for our faith with others, in the everyday situations of our lives. This will be repeated in the New Year for those who could not join it this month. In October we shall be offering the Bible Society 'Bible Course.' This provides an overview of the Bible and then begins to delve into how to read it well. If you have been reading the Bible for years but still have unanswered questions, or are unsure where to begin, be sure to come along. We believe, of course, as Christians, that the Bible contains all things necessary for life and faith. That is, the message conveyed through these books is one of hope, joy and God's grace to the world, seen most clearly in the person of Jesus Christ. The world in which we live can be mightily confusing, troublesome and there are many things that we could fear. Yet it is the testimony of thousands upon thousands of Christian people down the ages that God is faithful when we turn to trust him, because he loves us. The word of life held out to us in Jesus' coming among us, dying, and rising again to set us free from our fears and the sin that disfigures our world, is a sure and certain hope. I pray that over the coming months you too will have opportunity to discover how this hope is at work for you. Summary of PCC meeting held on Monday 4 September 2023 in the Lower Vestry Hall.

21 members of the PCC attended our 4 September meeting. As usual, many items were discussed including previous minutes and matters arising, finance and safeguarding. A deep clean of the kitchen was arranged for 8 September. Quotes for toilet refurbishment had been sourced and the work would be agreed soon. A replacement clapper for the fallen one had been agreed. In addition, the DAC were to be invited to visit and inspect the proposed ramp access.

It was agreed unanimously to re-employ Helen Smedley as a family worker. A number of coordinator roles had been filled by volunteers.

The role of verger needs consideration and anyone interested should contact either Tom or the church wardens to learn more. Please see a separate list of important dates to note.

The date of next PCC November 6th at 7pm.

Celebrating Harvest Home

ere in the Cathedral we begin October by hosting the National Harvest Festival, a service launched 10 years ago at Westminster Abbey by Queen Camilla, then Duchess of Cornwall. The service moves to a different city, or community every year and rather like the Olympics it includes the display of a symbolic harvest torch, and representatives from civic life and the farming community will gather in Peterborough to celebrate the gifts of creation in a tradition that will be shared by many parishes up and down the diocese.

What we think of as Harvest Festival dates back to the 1840's when the Revd Robert Hawker. Vicar of Morwenstow in Cornwall conducted a special thanksgiving service and blessed the crops that had been "safely gathered in". However, what came to be a key moment in the life of every community, has in recent decades been on the decline and the Harvest Torch is an initiative of the Love British Food campaign as part of British Food Fortnight to try and restore this tradition and to make the connections between our 'daily bread'. those responsible for producing it, and the God on whose bounty we ultimately depend.

The sad truth is that, the recognition of that interdependence has become ever more tenuous and our 24/7 urbanised culture has much less sense of rhythms of the seasons and the way our food is produced and brought to our tables. So, we pray, that as Peterborough welcomes the Harvest Torch this month it might prompt us to a renewed sense of genuine thanksgiving whilst also challenging us to think through issues of sustainability



and justice when it comes to producing our food and ensuring that none go hungry.

For a faith which has a meal as its central act of worship, we of all people, should never forget the deep connection between God our Creator and Redeemer and the need for our active participation in that relationship. As one of our Offertory prayers reminds us:

Blessed are you Lord God of all creation; through your goodness we have this bread to set before you, which earth has given and human hands have made. It will become for us the bread of life.

Enjoy the harvest, pray for the earth and our stewardship of it and always be mindful of the needs of others.
