Tom King writes ...

Hello everyone,

I hope that you are enjoying the Summer so far. Although we have had fewer fine days than perhaps hoped for in June and July, despite all the rain we can also be thankful to the Lord that we are not in drought. Perhaps this too can be a reminder that gratitude and praise have always been the end response of the faithful when we come to appreciate what God does and has



done for us – our salvation in Jesus and the sustenance of our lives.

That is not to say that we cannot also be honest before God at all times when faced with difficulty, or danger. It has been a very busy and complex few months since our last newsletter, with our own General Election, and with so many other countries around the world holding or preparing for similar democratic elections. There are also those countries that we hear of or know, that are led in autocratic, or more turbulent ways. While we here all still face pressures with the cost of living and sometimes difficult access to public services, we continue to receive news of wars and rumours of wars, and there is famine, flood and storm all over the world.

When we read the Bible, we find real people giving honest responses before God in light of all these different circumstances. When faced with hardship or distress, the biblical answer is lament – to tell God of our distress and pain – because we believe that he is who he says he is, and that he cares for us. The promises of God that we know in the resurrection of Jesus and the giving of the Holy Spirit show us that this remains true, for God loves the world.

When we do this, when we lament, when we pour out our confusion and upset, our grief or our lack of understanding, even our unbelief and disillusionment, we can return most readily to praise on the other side, because we know God is bigger than all our troubles. The Apostle Paul understood this well when he said that our current troubles are not to be compared to the glory that is to be revealed in us, the glory of God himself and our lives shared with Jesus. This is the testimony of the Church throughout the world, that Jesus has overcome the world. With this same confidence then, let's approach God honestly, in good and in bad, and pray that his kingdom come, now and always.

Mission Matters

Not the usual topic

For my Newsletter article, maybe, but one that matters to Jesus and so should matter to you and me too. I am writing about sex workers.

Church Army tells us that there are an estimated 105,000 people involved in sex work in the UK, most of them women, and that 76% of them suffer from some kind of post-traumatic stress disorder. Their back stories are often harrowing, including experience of sexual abuse, domestic violence and deprivation.

The Church Army "Ruby Project" exists to show them that God loves them and that they are precious to him. It gives them the opportunity to explore faith in Jesus and also offers practical help. A safe, welcoming drop-in service is available three times a week, providing meals, food parcels, a clothing bank and washing facilities, as well as enabling appointments with outside agencies. Also, there is support for those who have suffered emotional trauma.

The Project team also goes into red- light areas to meet women where they are, taking with them helpful items such as food and toiletries. Many of the women ask for prayer. There is a well-used prayer corner at the drop- in centre, also a faith exploration group.

The team are there, too, to help those women who are wanting to come out of sex work, enabling them to access the support and services which they need in order to do so.

Please do pray for this very worthwhile "Ruby Project", that the Lord will guide and encourage its team, supply every material need, and, by his Spirit, give wonderful new life, joy and freedom in Jesus to the women who access it.

It is for good reason that the Ten Commandments includes this. Rest allows us to draw closer to God, to take time to be and marvel at his creation, to take pleasure in hobbies and pastimes, to spend precious time with friends and family. Our world runs at a pace and we often have to be disciplined to stop and rest as God encourages us to. The bible scholar, Walter Brueggemann has written about



Sabbath rest and says this: 'Sabbath is not simply the pause that refreshes. It is the pause that transforms.'

Summer is often a time when we are able to pause and to rest and I hope that you will be able to do just that, and as you do I pray that you will draw close to God and sense more of his transforming presence in your life.

After the very successful and enjoyable concert produced by Ian Runnells and Lizzie Peacock, £347 was raised for St Mary's Church fund. Many thanks go to our two resident organists.





CONCERT REVIEW

From the first rousing notes of Handel and Bach played to full effect on our magnificent church organ, we knew we were in for a treat. This much anticipated concert was the brainchild of Ian Runnells collaborated by Lizzie Peacock, two local musicians who currently share the role of St Mary's organist on Sunday mornings and Ian also tutors the choir once a month.

lan Runnells has been Director of Music and organist at St Mary's Higham Ferrers, at St Paul's Church Bedford and at Wellingborough School, where he is currently responsible for music provision across the three schools, and the running of a busy academic and co-curricular programme as well as playing the organ on a freelance basis.

Lizzie Peacock is both an organist and a harpist, in great demand as the latter for weddings and events in the East Midlands as well as performing in hospitals and retirement homes and accompanying choirs and musical theatre groups as a pianist.

Their repertoire – wide ranging and perfectly suited to the occasion – flowed seamlessly from traditional folk tunes such as Greensleeves and Londonderry Air played sensitively on the harp by Lizzie, through the film tune Moonlight and Roses which Ian delivered on the organ in reflective mood, on to Lizzie with Irish, Scottish and Welsh folk songs which she accompanied with her mellifluous soprano voice, then Trumpet Minuet, Fanfare and Elves from Ian on the organ, ending the concert stupendously with the roof-raising Toccata from Widor's fifth Symphony – a perfect conclusion by these talented musicians we are so privileged to know.

To complete the event, savoury nibbles, delicious cakes and a choice of cold drinks were served by choir members during the interval and to end the concert Cathy Calder, a senior choir member, paid tribute to Ian and Lizzie and congratulated choir members Kathy and Chris MacKenzie for their hard work in making this happen. This was a 'first' a home-grown concert provided by our church for our church and judging by the response it received both during and afterwards, the hope is that it won't be the last!

Ringing a Peal is a big commitment and people don't go into it lightly. It is essential to prepare - mentally learning the methods inside out takes many hours and sometimes a lot longer, building the physical

ability to stand for around 3 hours, wearing comfortable footwear and clothing, and toughening up the skin of the hands through regular practice (but apart from the most hardened, ringers will get blisters on their hands from 3 hours pulling the ropes!). It was a very nice Peal and received interest on local social media pages.

We won the Branch striking competition at Mears Ashby which 8 local bands entered. Brenda and Alan are pictured with the winners' trophy.

The 5th Sunday of the month, which allows us a slightly longer ringing session, fell the weekend of Cathy's 6oth Birthday so we rang an 8th peal to celebrate.

Glyn Muncey, a former ringer at Rushden, sadly died and we rang for his funeral. He rang from the mid 1960's until 2003 – his ringing achievements included 5 peals and 313 quarter peals. He made a beautiful cross stitch embroidery of St Mary's Church which hangs in the tower (shown in the picture).

Cathy continues to have a busy year making sure our guild anniversary events are successful, including a tower open day and a publicity event at Stanwick Lakes with a mini ring of bells and showing the public the workings of a bell, raising interest and awareness.

Wishing Paul a speedy recovery from his knee replacement and he'll hopefully be able to climb the spiral staircase to the belfry and return to ringing in the not too distant future!

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Sepsis Information

Sepsis (commonly known as blood poisoning). Sepsis is the immune system's overreaction to an infection or injury. Sepsis is an emergency condition. With early diagnosis it can often be treated with antibiotics so it is vital that you know what to look out for.

Symptoms in Children

Any child may have sepsis if he or she:

Is breathing very fast.
Has a 'fit' or convulsion.
Looks mottled, bluish, or pale.
Has a rash that does not fade
when you press it.
Is very lethargic or difficult to wake.
Feels abnormally cold to touch.

Symptoms in Adults

Any adult may have sepsis if they show any of these signs:

Slurred speech or confusion.
Extreme shivering or muscle pain.
Passing no urine (in a day)
Severe breathlessness.
It feels like you're going to die.
Skin mottled or discoloured.

Call 111 or contact your GP if you're worried about an infection. Call 999 or visit A&E if someone has one of the sepsis symptoms.
