


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Glyn Ackerley writes ...

I love Autumn when the leaves on the trees turn many different shades of copper and gold. Then falling to the ground where they rustle and crunch underfoot. I love the aromas of our church's harvest festivals. I look forward to bonfire night each year and the preparations for Christmas. So Autumn is a sensory delight of perfumes, noises, feelings and tastes. We have dark evenings in the Autumn. In my prayer times in winter, I often light a candle to remind me that Jesus said, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness but will have the light of life." John 8v12.



The Bible has much to say about darkness and light. For example, Jesus says in John 3:19, "Light has come into the world, but people loved darkness instead of light because their deeds were evil." I believe he's talking about himself as 'the light of the World,' and people wanting to continue in their sin rather than finding forgiveness through faith in Him.

In Jesus teaching 'light' and 'darkness' seem to be about us choosing and receiving him as our 'light' or just continuing in spiritual darkness. John 1:5 says, "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it." The word 'overcome' can be translated as 'understood' or 'comprehended.' If we receive the truth of Christ and his light shines in our darkness, the whole of life begins to increasingly make sense.

Foraging in Autumn

There's nothing quite like a delicious meal of free foraged food. As summer turns to autumn,



hedgerow fruits ripen, providing a valuable food source for many species. Probably the most familiar of our autumn fruits is the blackberry or bramble, but there's plenty more to tempt the palate: elderberries and rosehips in the hedges, chestnuts and hazelnuts in the woods, and bilberries on the moors. Think wild fruit jelly and jam, roasted chestnuts, and of course what winter would be complete without a nip of sloe gin...

Mission Matters

"That's disgusting!"

I was a new missionary, adjusting to life in a bush village in Upper Volta (now called Burkina Faso), West Africa. At breakfast one morning, as I gazed sleepily out of the window, I noticed a person, some distance away, wandering around as if searching for something on the ground. Then they found it - a suitable spot at which to squat and defecate! (Bon appétit, Susan!)

Another day, a mother came to our compound carrying a cleft stick which held a sizeable worm. "My child vomited this worm" she told us as she asked for medicine.

These stories, and many others which I could relate, are disgusting disgusting because in this day and age millions of people still live without proper sanitation and millions of children get sick and die through lack of access to clean water.

Tearfund (The Evangelical Alliance Relief Fund) exists to help bring about transformation to the lives of those living in extreme poverty. This poverty may have been brought about by a number of inescapable factors, including conflict and injustice, natural disasters, climate change and pollution.

Tearfund's work is carried out in more than fifty countries around the world, never in a paternalistic way but in close collaboration with the local church. It says, "We believe that the global church is God's Plan A for transformation." I am so glad that we at St. Mary's are part of that plan, and that a portion of our tithe is always designated to Tearfund. St Mary's News

Summary of PCC meeting held on Monday 9 September 2024 in the Lower Vestry Hall.

Present: Archdeacon Alison, Rev Glyn A, Kate W, Marion B, Martin C, Rob B, James W, James M, Louise S, Peter C, Helen A and Jennie B. Apologies Rev Tom K, Helen S, Tony S, Rev Linnet S.

Alison was elected chair for this meeting, in Tom's absence.

Finance. Louise presented her report on finances. We should be mindful that reducing our parish share should be short term only and we must work with the diocesan authority. St Mary's is not alone in this situation and the Diocese are well aware of the struggles we all face.

Alison to investigate the situation with the rectory in Rectory Road. The most recent rectory at Meadowsweet Road would likely be rented out and used for a future incumbent.

Any new landlord/rental legislation is being looked at carefully so that our position as landlord is safe.

Fabric. We discussed sub groups to take forward any concerns and tasks that need attention. Findings would be brought back to the PCC for decision making. Sub groups should have at least 1 PCC member. The lift was repaired on Friday 13

September.

Alison explained the Quinquennial inspection is every 5 years by an architect (Mr Ringrose has been appointed), report comes to the PCC as the church fabric etc is the PCC's responsibility. Report lists works to be done as urgent (during the next 12-18 months).

Family worker. Holiday club took place over 3 days. Lighthouse resumed September 1. Helen S to re-engage in schools, Newton Rd, South End Infants & Juniors. Churches Together to work jointly especially leading up to Christmas Experience. Wraparound care at Newton Rd school being explored. CU at Rushden is developing, probably because of Illuminate. One example of the positive outcomes of Illuminate, results not always readily visible or quantitively. Illuminate taking a break for a couple of weeks so that new Year 7s get embedded and then can lead into their involvement. Helen mentioned a Reunion Party, ideally once a week where volunteers would be needed.

Safeguarding. No issues, Helen A reminded members of the domestic abuse course.

The Next PCC Meeting is on Monday 7 October at 7pm in the Lower Hall.

Reverend (Eric) John Tye by Rev Dr Glyn Ackerley



John became a Christian during his teenage years, influenced by Rev Tom Hughes. Initially he attended St Peter's church Rushden, where he and Christine were married. John and Christine (or Chris as she was known) joined St Mary's when they started a family. They both became very involved with the church, particularly the Missionary committee. They held Missionary Meetings at 24 Lodge Road. These meetings were so popular the overflow had to sit on the stairs and they had a downstairs bathroom built to cope with the numbers.

Later in life, John felt called to the ministry and was advised to become a non-stipendiary minister. He started training for ordination on the St Albans Ministerial training scheme. It was challenging, as he had to juggle his job and family responsibilities while traveling to Welwyn Garden City twice a week for lectures.

During this period, John was involved in a horrific car accident and was not expected to survive. I remember being called to an emergency meeting to pray for him that evening. After much prayer, he gradually recovered. His lecturer brought his coursework to him, which proved to be a blessing as he had plenty of time to study. Eventually, John was able to return to his studies, thanks to the support of many parishioners from St Mary's who helped transport him to and from the station.

John was ordained a Deacon in 1981 and a Priest in 1982. He assisted at St Mary's and served as Priest-in-Charge at St Peter's, Newton Bromswold, for over 20 years perhaps more. Plus he was padre to the Rushden branch of the Royal British Legion.

John 1:1-14 was one of his favourite readings. When John was doing his theological training, it is fashionable to suggest that John's gospel was written later than the others because of its beauty, depth of language and complexity. People even doubted that John the Apostle wrote it. Especially this chapter 1 which has been described as one of the most complex philosophical writings in history. John the young Galilean fisherman who was one of the very first to follow Jesus, could he have written it? In the book of Acts chapter 4v13 John and Peter were described as "unschooled, ordinary men."

Well, I think along with an increasing number of theologians think John's gospel was not a late addition to the New Testament books and was written in the same time period as Mark, Matthew and Luke. The young Galilean fisherman as an apostle was engaged in many missions in the Greek/Roman world. He had to learn to communicate to that culture and would have learned to write and to understand their way of thinking. That was easily attainable in 20-30 years after the resurrection. If you read the whole gospel that describes Jesus, deep teaching to the inner group of disciples, Jesus reveals his divine nature by referring to himself as "I am" the name of God many times as he does in the John 14 reading. "I am the way, the truth and the life."

John 1 says that through Jesus – the word, the world and in fact everything was created. This Jesus is the light who shines in our lives that we might see the truth. John the Apostle says that people did not receive Jesus, but to those who did receive him, to those who believed in his name, **He** gave the right to become Children of God. And that's what he does for us today as well as we put our faith in Jesus. He gives us the right to become children of God.

Reverend John Tye must have meditated on this many times and put his trust and encouraged many others to believe in Jesus name.

The John 14 reading gives some insight into the heavenly realm, which Jesus describes as his Father's house. He says to the disciples that he will prepare a place for them. He says he is the way and we can come into the presence of the Father <u>only through him</u>. That we are forgiven and made right with God, despite our many sins, through faith in Jesus and his saving death and resurrection.

I'm sure that John Tye believed in this throughout his life and held onto the truth of Christ in his last moments. He will know now what the heavenly realm is truly like, he will meet with Christine there and many friends who have gone before. Of that I am sure.

Belfry Gossip

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Bonfire Night Safety Tips


Firework Code

Only buy fireworks marked BS 7114 - Don't drink alcohol if setting off fireworks – Keep fireworks in a closed box – Follow the instructions on each firework – Light them at arm's length, using a taper – Stand well back – Never go near a firework that has been lit – even if it hasn't gone off, it could still explode – Never put fireworks in your pocket or throw them – Always supervise children around fireworks – Light sparklers one at a time and wear gloves – Never give sparklers to a child under five – Keep pets indoors – Don't let off fireworks after 11pm.

Bonfire Safety Tips

Warn your neighbours beforehand – so they are aware and can make necessary preparations – Only burn dry material, do not burn anything which is wet or damp, this causes more smoke – Check there are no cables (telephone wires etc.) above the bonfire – Build the bonfire away from sheds, fences and trees – Don't use petrol or paraffin to start the fire it can get out of control quickly.

Once the bonfire is lit, make sure you: Keep a bucket of water or a garden hose nearby – in case of emergencies – Don't leave the bonfire unattended – Keep children and pets away from the bonfire – Don't throw any fireworks into the fire – Don't burn aerosols, tyres, canisters or anything containing foam or paint – this could produce toxic fumes and some containers may explode, causing injury – Once the bonfire has died down, spray the embers with water to stop reigniting.
