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# Tom King writes ...

Hello everyone! As we enter Advent this year, I am minded to wonder: where do we get our news? News is what is new, and we seemingly have an insatiable appetite for what is new. I am writing here for our newsletter, but these days people are far more likely to find out what is new from TikTok or Instagram. Even five years ago these were being called the 'new media,' but the needs for communication during the Covid lockdowns made sure that these surged forwards and, I am reliably informed by teenagers I know, that Facebook is now only for 'old people.'

However we get our news though, what are we expecting? What we seem to see most of the time is bad news. This frequently leads to people only listening to the news they like, or what they want to hear, because listening to or reading things that upset us can be overwhelming. Yet still we seek news, perhaps because we have the persistent hope that things will get better, or because we have a longing for someone to solve the problems that we see around us.

'Like cold water to a weary soul is good news from a distant land,' says the Book of Proverbs. Good news is refreshing, it brings us alert, it restores energy and hope. Heaven – where God is – has been painted often as a 'distant shore,' but the Good News that we remind each other of at Advent is the greatest Good News of all - that God himself, who created everything there is, is coming to be with us in the here and now! The first time this happened, when Jesus was born, it was so momentous that thousands upon thousands of angels filled the sky to sing about it. We are still expecting him now to come for a second time. In both of these, he is the one who meets our longings for someone to 'sort things out.'

Jesus was very realistic with his friends and followers when he told them to expect him coming again. He said then that this would be a difficult time, a time when bad news would indeed seem overwhelming. He said, in fact, that it would look very much like what we see now, with violence and war and hardship on every side. But the promise of God is that these things are not final, they don't have the last word. The promise of God is that he will sort it out, and the guarantee of this is Jesus' resurrection.

We celebrate Advent and Christmas at the darkest point of the year to remember that light and life will overcome, that Good News is always new, even when it's old. So I hope that you too are able to hear this good news from a distant land, that you would be refreshed and that you have a merry Christmas and a blessed New Year.

# **Mission Matters**

How would you feel...

...if the pastor of your church had very limited understanding of the Bible and practically no training in teaching or preaching its message? Confused? Unsatisfied? Disengaged? And if you, yourself, were that pastor, how would you feel? Inadequate? Frustrated? Anxious? Alone?

Did you know that it is estimated that in the Majority World fewer than one in four pastors have had the opportunity to receive adequate training? Langham Partnership knows how important the role of the pastor is in the local church. He needs to give sound Bible teaching, often to people who are not able to read for themselves, to encourage believers to grow in their faith and to lead them in telling others in their community about Jesus.

Langham works in many countries to help meet this need for trained local pastors. Those who are called to leadership travel to annual seminars and meet for one week to learn how to study the Bible. Then they return home to join preaching circles in their own communities where they, pastors and lay leaders, receive ongoing help and support. This scheme works very well and has brought hope to God's people whose lives are often challenged by poverty, lack of education and much hardship.

Please do pray for our Christian brothers and sisters who follow Jesus in places in which life can be difficult. And do look on line to find out more about the important ministry of Langham Partnership to the growing church in the Majority World.

# St Mary's News

## Summary of PCC meeting held on Monday 4 November 2024 in the Lower Vestry Hall.

Present: Tom K, Helen S, Kate W, James W, Glyn A, Tony S, Louise S, Helen A, Martin Co, Bob B, Marion B.

Apologies received from James M, Peter Co and Jennie B.

**Finance.** LS reported that all financial obligations had been met despite overall income being £17,678 less than in 2023 to 31 August. TK recommended prayer and that we listen to the Lord. Stewardship Sunday will take place on 23 February 2025.

**Fabric.** TK thanked Sam for organising the recent repairs to the roof. BB mentioned that Mick H acquired a sign to warn of uneven ground outside. TK confirmed that this will be located facing people approaching up the slope as those coming down are likely to proceed more cautiously.

LS agreed to provide media consent forms to enable the pictures to be used on the church website.

**Mission** Sue E registered her concerns about possible future changes to the annual church tithe. Sue referred to the early churches in "extreme poverty", who gave with "overflowing joy" and "rich generosity" because they "gave themselves first to the Lord." 2 Corinthians 8:1-7. Sue related her own experience as a missionary in West Africa with no guaranteed income, and dependent on gifts from Christians which provided for her needs. Sue believes that giving a tithe is an act of worship and thanksgiving to God and prays that we renew our commitment to Him by continuing to give generously.

In 2023, the income from unrestricted funds was £124,328. TK observed that what we have always done may not be the way to proceed now. St Mary's must agree what we define as "mission". MB reminded the PCC that, as a church, we tithe money for which the church is responsible, and that one of our existing mission partners, CPAS, is also a patron. TK is asking for a real connection. TK spoke about HS's work with Newton Road School and assured the meeting that God will provide. Our attitude towards each other and God is central to this.

The church is the body of Christ. TK remarked that new people coming in to meet Jesus will be different to us, being at an earlier/different stage of their faith journey.

MC proposed an allocation of tithe

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## Korean Link in good heart

ast month I was privileged to visit our link Church in Korea for the consecration of a new Bishop of Seoul, Bishop Elijah. His predecessor, Bishop Peter, had attended Bishop Debbie's welcome service in Peterborough earlier this year.

Our link relationship is in good heart. Since all the Korean bishops and their wives visited Northampton and Kettering a few years ago, we have welcomed students to camp at the Greenbelt Festival, provided a six-week placement for an ordinand and established three parish to parish partnerships. One of our clergy took a sabbatical at the Anglican university in Seoul.

I was made very welcome, joined worship in the now completed new Cathedral in Daejeon (it was a hard hat building site on my last visit!), and visited all three dioceses, including the port/resort city of Busan.

The consecration service which is available to view online was graced by four Archbishops, but our hosts kept talking about their connection with Peterborough and it was moving to realise how precious our relationship is to them.



In his inaugural address Bishop Elijah spoke humbly of the Bishop's calling to be a servant, helping the whole Church to flourish. He concluded; "When the Church is faithful to its identity, God will use it, no matter the challenges of the time. Let us strive to be a Church that reflects the Kingdom of God, serving with love and dedication."

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## Sylvia Brandford by Rev Dr Glyn Ackerley



Sylvia was born on 27th November 1933, the first child of Edna and Ernest Hollingworth, in Mansfield, Nottinghamshire. She always said that she had a happy childhood. It was not all plain sailing. When she was 6 her mum gave birth to their second child that Sylvia had decided would be called Margaret. She was initially a bit disappointed that her little sister turned out to be her brother, Trevor, but after a brief thought, she told the midwife that they could keep himand they were good friends as adults and kept in touch regularly.

When she was 7 or 8 a distant relative gave her a violin. Her mother found a teacher, and this led to compulsory hourly violin practices every day which she did not enjoy – but she did become a very accomplished violinist. She went to orchestra camps as a teenager – an idea that her grandchildren find very entertaining – and through it she met David, her husband. Her parents went to the Salvation Army where brass instruments are featured so a violin was different. A Mr Brandford heard her play and invited her to Bury to play at the Salvation Army there. She stayed with Mr and Mrs Brandford, and it so happened that their son David, who was in the Air Force, was home on leave. He had already told his dad that he was not to be introducing him to any girls! But He met Sylvia, and that was it. They were married three years later – he was absolutely the love of her life, and they were together 60 years.

Sylvia and David had 2 sons, Paul and Peter and in 1964, when they were 8 and 6 years old respectively, the family sailed to South Africa and took the train to Zambia to work for the Salvation Army as they needed engineers and that was David's profession at the time. However, once there, he was given a completely different job, one not really suited to him. Then Sylvia found that she was pregnant again. So, they came back to the UK and lived temporarily with Sylvia's parents, Edna and Ernest in their little 2-bedroom bungalow. Their third child,

Philippa was born in December, always disappointed to have been born in Mansfield when she could have been born in Zambia which sounded much more exotic! After this they moved around the country with David's jobs but eventually settled in Rushden in 1970. Sylvia worked for a little at Wilkins and Denton, where she met Hilary who became one of her best friends. Her last job was working nights as a care assistant in Rushden Hospital. She worked hard all her life.

She loved to find the fun in life. She had a great sense of humour which could be quite sharp and dark, and which just occasionally was misunderstood by people and caused offence, which she would never do deliberately. Her laugh was memorable and joyful. It has been passed down and can be heard among the grandchildren.

She loved to make things. She taught her children to bake, sew and knit. She taught some of the grandchildren lacemaking. She embroidered cards for people. She knitted school jumpers, made dresses, she was rarely found doing nothing. In the evening when the TV was on, or there were quiet moments on her night shift at work, she would be knitting away.

She loved David, her husband. She was a very stay- at -home person. No one would have believed that she would ever leave Mansfield! But she loved David enough to follow him around the country and even to Zambia, with his work. He was the love of her life – and she was his. She knew that she had pushed herself too hard to look after him at the end of his life, but she said often that she would happily do it all again.

She loved to find the joy in life. She was gifted with being a 'Glass half full' person, very like her dad had been, which meant that she made the best of everything she could and always found the positives in life.

Which brings us to the greatest love in Sylvia's life. She loved her Lord. She had a very deep and profound faith in Christ. Obviously as she grew, her faith grew in depth and maturity and all her life, whatever she was involved in, she was serving Him. He came first. She read her bible and prayed every day. She brought her children to faith in Christ. She helped in Sunday schools in various places that she lived. She sang in the Salvation Army songsters and then in the choir at St Mary's when she and David started coming here. She helped at, then led, Mother's Union and started a choir among the ladies there. She and David were involved with the Gideons, who place Bibles in various institutions, and they gave sacrificially to God's work in various forms despite never having a great deal of money themselves. These are just some of the many things she did in serving the Lord Jesus.

Be aware of your belongings when you are in a crowd – there may be pickpockets around.
