

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Tom King writes ...

Dear all,

Happy New Year! I hope this finds you having had a blessed Christmas season so far. I say so far because traditionally the church finishes the season of Christmas at Candlemas on 2 February, forty days after Christmas. Some cultures still leave their Christmas decorations up 'til then'! Clearly, in



this country, we no longer follow this in society at large, so we might ask what it's about, having perhaps forgotten some of the reason behind it. Candlemas traditionally was to celebrate the presentation of the infant Jesus in the Temple in Jerusalem. It was a thing that Hebrew parents did at the time; a rite of passage, required in Scripture, one of many (see Luke 2 for the story).

What matters most for us right now, however, is to remember that the story of Christmas doesn't finish with Christmas, or New Year. The story of Christmas is ongoing even now. Jesus is called 'the light of revelation' and 'God's salvation.' What he reveals, especially, is the hearts and motives of those who encounter him. Encountering the Good News of his birth, life, death and resurrection reveals that human motives prefer darkness, and we are far from God. We need only look around. In the 2000 years since then, not much has changed in the way humans treat each other.

But Jesus is 'God's salvation' – God gives him to us as a way back, a way out, the way into peace. Here in the Northern hemisphere, at this, the darkest time of year, it makes sense to remember that in both literal and figurative darkness, Jesus Christ appears to show a way back to God, to be the light in the darkness, and to be the means by which we can be saved into God's wonderful light.

Mission Matters

Not easy, but...!

It is far from easy living for God in the Czechia where there are so few Christians. Lea and Petra feel that their efforts are small and fragile in the light of the challenges they face, but say, "We give thanks to God for the gracious and beautiful way he is at work in the lives of those we serve." They thank all who faithfully pray for them and send warm greetings to all at St. Mary's.

You will remember that when Russia invaded Ukraine many refugees arrived in the Czechia. Petra has been working with an agency called Vesna in the city of Brno and tells us that new arrivals are still coming every week, needing help in every way. She is keen to ensure that those who are traumatised are able to access emotional support and that children will not miss out on education. She asks us to pray.

News from the church led by Lea is good. Several new people are attending and others are growing in faith and preparing for baptism. His work amongst university students has also been rewarding. Now, as well as Bible studies in English, there are those held in Czech and Slovak. Students are sharing the Gospel with others, and we are asked to pray for those who are exploring faith for the first time.

Lea and Petra also ask us to pray for their daughter, Olivia, as she prepares to start secondary school. She is finding this a daunting prospect.

Thank you for bringing the requests mentioned here to the Lord, and please do keep praying for Lea and Petra, Olivia and Ted, and for the many people, young and old, students, refugees and neighbours amongst whom they live and with whom they share the love and truth of the Lord Jesus. And do give thanks to God for the ways in which he is blessing their faithful ministry in this spiritually needy land.

St Mary's News

Summary of PCC meeting held on Monday 20 January 2025 in the Lower Vestry Hall.

Present: Tom K, Helen S, Glyn A, Tony Sm, Louise S, Martin Co, Bob B, Marion B, and Peter Co. Apologies received from James M, Kate W and Jennie B.

Christmas experience, HS reported that a large number of children visited the church from various schools in Rushden during December. The children enjoyed the experience, and they were told the Christmas story. HS is planning to run the Easter experience with the schools in the town in April.

Finance, LS reported a deficit of £38,670.00 for December. LS reported there are more bills to be paid before the year end accounts can be created.

LS advised the PCC that she will resign from the treasurer post in June 2025. We discussed the challenges that LS had as the Treasurer. We agreed the task was a lot for one person. The PCC thanked Louise for the work she had done as the Treasurer. Post her resignation Nula S, who works for the Diocese will maintain the church accounts.

Safeguarding, Helen A resigned from the post of safeguarding officer on the 31 of December 2024.

The church must have a safeguarding officer and Rev Tom has a potential candidate. The PCC agreed that Vicki K to co-ordinate with the Diocese safeguarding team to train a new safeguarding officer.

Fabric, Ecclesiastical Insurance. We received 3 recommendations from the insurance company from their due diligence discussion in December 2024 as follows:

Fire risk assessment. We will discuss with John M to perform a fire safety risk assessment.

Lightning source protection. This would allow the power to continue if the church was struck by lightning. The church electric wiring was to be reviewed during the Quinquennial inspection.

The Boiler with R.F Blount and Sons Ltd provided a quote to renew their boiler service contract for another year. We discussed the servicing of the boiler which must be done by industrial plumbing and heating specialists. The boiler does need to be serviced on an annual basis. The service agreement will cost £774. On a long-term basis, we need to look at using renewable energy.

The Upper Church Hall door broken window has had a contribution of £200 towards the repair. The actual cost of repairing the window will be £582.22.

We discussed and concluded that the ramp will be used when anyone visits the church using a wheelchair. This will remain in place for the entire service. The West door will now be opened for people who are unhappy about using the ramp in the North Porch. In addition, we must ensure there is no excessive wind flow through the church because of both doors being open.

On Monday 27 January Rev Tom K and R. Stainer met the church Quinquennial surveyor Adrian to discuss which church door can have a permanent ramp built to allow people wheelchair access to the church.

In the Sunday service the children will be in the choir vestry as the bell tower was too cold and dirty.

Illuminate, one year on and we are still getting good number of youths attending the meetings.

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God rested – and so should we

love the episode in the gospels when, after a long day, Jesus finds a quiet place to escape on his own. The disciples discover him and like rather fussy business managers badger him saying:

"Lord, everyone is looking for you". He replies; "Let's go somewhere else"! (Mark 1.35-38)

Even our Lord Jesus Christ, needed breaks to recover from the busyness of ministry, to refresh himself, to sleep and to pray. It was a vital part of his rhythm of life.

God set a model for this when, after six full days creating the universe, the seventh day was deliberately set aside for rest. (Genesis 2.2)

Keeping a healthy pattern of work and rest (and play) is vital for all of us. This means being careful to protect Days Off and Holidays from the encroachment of work and helping each other to balance work and recreation. Clergy and laity can support good practice in looking after ourselves appropriately. In addition, clergy are encouraged to take study leave ("sabbatical") every seven years for personal and professional development.

I am really grateful that the Church has granted me three months sabbatical



leave from January to March next year. For half this time, I will serve as a Chaplain with the Missions to Seafarers and for the remainder will focus on catching up with my theological reading.

My colleague in the Bishops' Office, Suzanne Carter, will continue to look after the diary in preparation for my return in April. I look forward to Church and School visits and Mission Weekends later in the year.

Northants water vole comeback starts with release at Nene Wetlands

A few weeks ago 116 water voles bred in captivity were released to the nature reserve and more will follow next year. The release was funded and licensed by Natural England as part of its Species Recovery Programme.

Water voles in Northamptonshire are now restricted to a few isolated colonies. The last records for the area around Nene Wetlands Nature Reserve are from around the year 2000. The Wildlife Trust has been working with partners in the county including Stanwick Lakes country park and Water Resources East to create the right conditions for water voles return. It is hoped that this project will be the start of a meta population of water voles which can then expand across Northamptonshire.

Matt Johnson, Wildlife Trust BCN Conservation Manager, said: "It's fantastic to see water voles return to the Nene Wetlands – we hope that this is the start of their comeback in the county."

"When we took on this reserve over ten years ago water voles were one of the key species that we wanted to see back here so it's really exciting to see them coming out of their Pringles tubes and making their way back into the wild where they should be.

Water voles have suffered in the UK in recent years. Their numbers have been dramatically shrank as a result of habitat loss and the impact of invasive mink along waterways."



Belfry Gossip
