
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Glyn Ackerley writes ...

It may be of interest to St Mary's people that during the series of Sermons on 'Lament', St Peter's Newton Bromswold have been having readings and Sermons based on the set readings from the Lectionary. Sunday 21 September was St Matthew's day, and the Gospel reading was from Matthew 9:9-13, the calling of Matthew the Tax Collector. Matthew left his occupation to follow Jesus and became one of the Twelve disciples, who were the core group of Jesus' followers.



In my early research on this passage, I found a sermon on it published online by a London Vicar. At the very beginning, the preacher says, "This story we've heard from the Gospel is the calling of Matthew who, we are told in 10:3, went on to become a disciple of Jesus. It's very unlikely that this is the Matthew who wrote the Gospel of Matthew. The Gospel itself was probably written, at the very earliest, AD 80 or 90 but it is thought that the disciple Matthew, who features in this story, was martyred about AD 70 in Ethiopia."


Now, I agree that Matthew died about AD 70 or even AD 68, but not the Vicar's dating of the Gospel. Matthew was in the decades after the Resurrection of Jesus a very busy evangelist and teacher. I believe he initially led local missions among the Jews and others, but then went further afield, possibly to Persia, and then to Ethiopia, where he was martyred.

The Vicar who wrote the sermon I've mentioned is also an 'academic' and has taught in one of our more 'evangelical' theological colleges. I'm not sure if he's aware, but to date, the Gospel's twenty or even ten years later than the date of Matthew's death could cast some doubt on the reliability of Matthew's Gospel as an eyewitness account of Jesus' life, ministry, and teaching. It raises the question, who was the actual author and was he or she an eyewitness? Dating Matthew and Mark after AD70, like many scholars do, leaves the gospel writers open to the charge of adding prophecies by Jesus after the event had occurred. Most notably, the destruction of Jerusalem and the temple, which occurred in AD 69-70. I was introduced to the late dating of the Gospels during my theology studies in Durham in the mid-1980s. At the time, I didn't think to question it. However, I now disagree with the late dating of the Gospels. What follows is my personal opinion after considerable study of the Gospels.

I date Mark to somewhere between 35 and 45AD, so possibly less than 20 years after the events it describes. Matthew, as we have it shortly after, perhaps 46-48 AD. Some may ask, why then is Matthew the first Gospel in our New Testaments? Well, some early church leaders called the 'Early Church Fathers' wrote that Matthew set down the first Gospel in his own language, Aramaic, the language that Jesus spoke. Most notably, Bishop Papias, who says he knew the Apostles. In my opinion, this is one reason that Matthew is the first Gospel in the New Testament, a gospel written by an apostle, one of the original 12 disciples of Jesus. I believe what happened is that Mark wrote his Gospel, and Matthew, when he saw it, thought he had missed a lot out, but I'll use most of his material because I know where he got his information from another Apostle, Peter. Almost all of Mark is word-for-word in Matthew. Why would the eyewitness Matthew copy it into his Gospel if he didn't know the source? He thought, yes, Mark is correct, but I'll add some of my own memories, for example, the Sermon on the Mount in Matthew, chapter 5. And by the way, I'll correct his poor standard of Greek while I'm there. You see, Matthew was a tax official.

He was used to writing letters and bills in the commercial language of the time, Greek.

Critics of my view might say, oh, Professor so and so says it's much later, but I've got good reasons for believing it's early and there are some thoughtful academics whose writings have encouraged me in this view. There are some subtle pieces of internal evidence in Mark, for example, his portrayal of Jesus regarding his strict adherence to the Jewish law. That is the



actual law from the Bible, not what people like the Scribes and the Pharisees added to it.

Mark was not an Apostle; he was, I believe, a companion of the Apostle Peter and his Gospel is based on Peter's memories and teachings about Jesus. Mark was most likely composed before Christians started disagreeing about whether they should strictly keep the Old Testament food and ceremonial law, or not, which took place somewhere between 35 and 45AD.

Why do I think this? Well, because a read-through of Mark and Matthew shows that Jesus strictly kept to the actual law. Jesus wore the fringe required by the law for Jewish men on his clothes. When Jesus healed the leper in Mark 1:40-45 and Matthew 8:1-4, he told him to go and show himself to the priest, as required by the law. In Mark 10:17-27, Jesus points the rich young ruler to the ten commandments, and when answering a question about the greatest commandment in Mark 12:28-31, Jesus quotes directly from the law, from Deuteronomy 6.

My conclusion is that it is possible that Mark was written 35-45 AD, and Matthew, as we have it, shortly after, say 46-48 AD. Luke, after that, somewhere in the early 60s AD or even the 50s AD. There are, of course, thoughtful academics who have set the date of Mark in the late 50s AD and Matthew and Luke in the decade following; they may be right, but to date them after AD70, in my view, is problematic, as I've explained. So, I think that the Gospels, being far from late, are very early documents that communicate to us the teaching and practice of Jesus as observed by the earliest eyewitnesses. They are reliable and trustworthy accounts of the ministry and teaching of Jesus. I say thank God for Matthew and his gifts learned as a tax collector and official, which were used to set down the Gospel in writing.

Mission Matters

Is it really possible...that someone whose life and community have been marred and stunted by extreme poverty can learn how to thrive? Well, Jesus assures us that, "With God all things are possible." (Matt.19:26) - so, YES! YES! It is!!

You may perhaps remember a previous "Mission Matters" article which spoke about a Tearfund project called "Transforming Communities" which is taking place in some of the world's poorest countries. This project begins with Bible-based training for the local church, which leads its members to reach out to their community. They help their neighbours to see the potential of resources which they may already have and to decide how these can be put to good use. This may involve learning new farming skills, setting up support and savings groups or working together on ways to improve the community.

Tearfund has seen the enormous benefit that this project has brought to many lives and has published the findings of an independent, large-scale study which has investigated its effects. The study's conclusion is that, in the eight countries from which data was gathered, the results are inspiring. Sustainable and far-reaching transformation has taken place! It has been found that people living in communities with a "Transforming Communities" project are more satisfied with their lives and experience improvements in economic, environmental, personal, social and spiritual wellbeing. The role of the church in this has shown to be vital.

Rev Leviticus Ibrahim from Nigeria concludes, "Life is a journey. If the church goes to the community and holds the hands of the community, they will move together. There will be a change, both physical and spiritual."

"Amen" to those wise words! And "Praise the Lord!" "With God all things are possible!"



Neighbourhood Watch Know your emergency phone numbers!

There are 5 emergency services in the UK: Police, Ambulance, Fire brigade, Coastguard and Mountain/cave rescue, all reachable via 999 or 112. Both connect you to the emergency services police, fire, ambulance and coastguard and are free to call from any phone, including mobiles and payphones.



Call 999 for life-threatening medical emergencies like a serious accident, severe breathing difficulties or someone has stopped breathing. Call 999 if a crime is in progress or someone is in danger.

Call 101 is the non-emergency number for the Police in England and Wales if you witness a crime or have information that may help the police. e.g. wish to report a stolen car, property damage or a minor traffic accident Call 111 (the non-emergency number for the NHS) for urgent medical help that is not an emergency, such as when you need medical advice fast but unsure who to call, need an out-of-hours GP or are unsure which urgent care service to use.

999 is the traditional UK emergency number, while 112 is the pan-European emergency number that also works in the UK. Both numbers connect to the same emergency services (police, ambulance, fire, coastguard) in the UK and are available to use. You can use either 999 or 112 for any emergency situation, and 112 is particularly useful for visitors from other countries who are already familiar with it. You can call 999 or 112 for any life-threatening emergency, such as a fire, serious injury or crime. Both numbers are free to call.

British Transport Police (BTP) emergencies, call 999. For non-emergencies, call 0800 40 50 40 or text 61016 to report incidents, seek advice, or report issues on the rail network. For other transport (buses, roads), call 101 for non-emergencies.
